The Newbery Bowl (shot at 300 and 500 yards) and 600 yard full-bore competitions (both internal Club competitions) were shot at Bisley on 11th May 2025. The shoot was well supported with 12 members turning out. The Newbery Bowl was won by Henry Sanders with a score of 96.8v (ie 8 vbulls), Martin Whatton 2nd on 94.6v and Charles Asquith 3rd on 92.3v. The 600 yard competition was won by Russell Hodgson-Jones with a score of 49.3v, Henry Sanders 2nd on 47.3v and Charles Asquith 3rd on 46.2v.

Breaking Boundaries: From Wellingborough to Hong Kong

I've been fortunate to tick off some special milestones in my cricketing life, but none mean as much to me as becoming the first female Captain of Cricket at the Hong Kong Cricket Club (HKCC). It's an honour steeped in nearly two centuries of cricketing tradition and one that brings my story full circle, from the pitches of Wellingborough School to one of Asia's oldest and most iconic clubs.

It all started at Wellingborough School, where cricket quickly became more than a game; it became a calling. At fifteen, I had the extraordinary honour of becoming the first girl to be selected for the Boys' 1st XI under Mr. Hilton's leadership. I still vividly remember walking into Mr. Bowe's office, who was Deputy Head at the time, cricket bag in hand, asking if I could play in the boys' team. He looked at me and said, "Are you any good?" before marching me straight to the nets. That day changed everything. A season with the U15 boys led to three seasons with the 1st XI, years that gave me confidence, resilience, and some of my happiest memories. The thatched pavilion, MCC lunches, friends cheering from the boundary, and parents enjoying the school wine on sun-drenched Saturday afternoons all formed the backdrop of the most formative period of my life. Teachers like Mr. Askham and Mr. Ramsden inspired and pushed me, teaching lessons that extended far beyond the field, about teamwork, leadership, and self-belief.

Wellingborough gave me the foundation to join the Northamptonshire Academy as the first girl to do so, before stepping into the England pathway, where I earned my first cap at seventeen and represented both the England Academy and the England A team. After university at Loughborough, I moved north to captain Lancashire Thunder, leading a professional side for five fulfilling years. Cricket took me across the world, but one tour changed my path forever; the inaugural MCC Women's Tour to China and Hong Kong, led by Mike Gatting. I immediately fell in love with Hong Kong: a city where the sea, peaks, and skyline collide in perfect harmony, and where cricket, like the city itself, has an extraordinary sense of community and history.

Founded in 1851, the Hong Kong Cricket Club is among the oldest cricket institutions outside England, predating most others in Asia. Originally located in the heart of Central on Chater Road, the Club's first ground witnessed 124 years of matches before relocating in 1975 to its present site at Wong Nai Chung Gap, a stunning hillside location, boasting the famous skyline on the horizon. Cricket at HKCC is steeped in heritage; the Club hosted its first Interport match against Shanghai in 1866 and later introduced the Bokhara Bell trophy after a tragic typhoon in 1892 claimed the lives of eleven Hong Kong players. This is just one example of the relationships that we have built across the world. As of 2025, the HKCC has approximately 70 reciprocal clubs worldwide, spanning Asia, Australasia, Europe, North America, and Africa. These partnerships include some of the most prestigious sporting and social institutions globally, such as the Marylebone Cricket Club, Melbourne Cricket Club, Singapore Cricket Club, Royal Bangkok Sports Club, Royal Selangor Club (Kuala Lumpur), Toronto Cricket, Skating & Curling Club, and many others. HKCC's reciprocal arrangements allow members to access facilities and accommodation when travelling abroad. The network is designed to promote international sporting exchange and member travel privileges, reinforcing HKCC's reputation as one of the most connected and historic cricket clubs in the world.





HKCC's facilities are world-class: a first-class cricket ground, a 3 lane indoor cricket center, outdoor pools, seven restaurants and bars, a fitness centre, golf simulators, ten-pin bowling, outdoor tennis and indoor squash courts and a lawn-bowling green. The cricket section alone boasts over 500 juniors, 14 adult teams including three women's sides, and a thriving development pathway that supports both local and international players. HKCC isn't just a club, it's a community; a place where families, players, and generations share the same love for the game.

While on that MCC tour a decade ago, I was unexpectedly offered the position of Women's Head Coach at HKCC. It wasn't something I'd planned, but after some careful thought, I accepted, and it turned out to be the best decision I could have made. After two years in the role, I transitioned into the corporate world while remaining active at the Club, and this year marks my tenth with HKCC. In June 2025, I was humbled to be appointed Captain of Cricket, the first woman to hold the role in the Club's 175-year history. The Captain's position sits at the heart of the Club's leadership, working alongside the Chairman and General Manager and sitting on the General Committee with Directorship of the club, to oversee all cricketing matters and contribute to the Club's broader direction. To be entrusted with such responsibility at an institution built on legacy and excellence, is a privilege beyond words.

Just weeks into my tenure, I led a 76-strong contingent of players, members, supporters, and families on an unforgettable tour of England. We played at some of the country's most quintessential venues including The Honourable Artillery Company, Oxford Parks, Arundel Castle, Petworth Park, and Wormsley (Sir Paul Getty's iconic ground) before walking out onto the hallowed turf at Lord's. We played on the Day 6 wicket of the England-India Anderson-Tendulkar Trophy Test, after spending days 2, 4, and 5 in a box at Lord's carefully analysing the surface, before taking on MCC ourselves. To captain HKCC on pitch 12, the centre wicket at Lord's, was the proudest moment of my leadership so far, culminating in a surreal moment: finding myself on a hat-trick ball against Clare Taylor, one of England's finest batters. The cherry on top moment for dedicating so many years to this wonderful sport. I can probably retire now!

As HKCC approaches its 175th anniversary in 2026, I am honoured to lead it into this next chapter. Cricket has given me a lifetime of experiences, travelling the world, lifelong friendships, leadership opportunities, and lessons in resilience. But I trace it all back to Wellingborough School, where the foundation was laid, the place that believed in me, challenged me, and shaped who I am. Those years were the happiest of my life, and I remain deeply grateful for the teachers, friends, and memories that started the journey.

Thank you, Wellingborough, for lighting the spark that continues to burn brightly today, from the school pavilion to the heart of Hong Kong.

My personal motivation has been about creating positive social change. For all of us, so much remains to be done.'

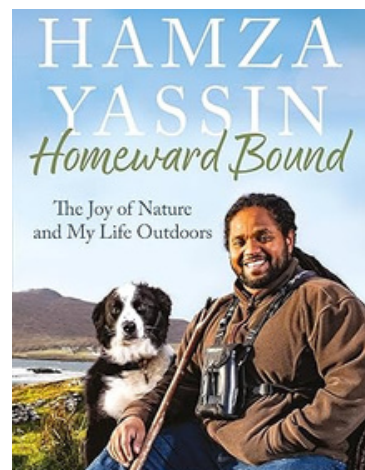


Hamza Yassin's new book and TV series

The spotlight continues to shine for OW Adrian Bracken (57-68, G)

Adrian Bracken (Garne's 57-68) is still working as an Actor, at 75, on Film and TV, together with regular Voice-Over work using his wide variety of English language accents at his home professional studio. Recent feature films have been "The Visitor" (2024)," Bad Patriots" (2025) and "Serial Killers Anonymous" due for release in 2026 – (a real blood and guts Horror film, in which Adrian plays a hammer wielding member of an elite club of psychopathic killers). TV, in 2025, has included two Chinese TV Series - "Farewell My Lover" (Netshort 2025) partially filmed at Hinwick House (near Wellingborough), and "Orange Flame of Fury" (Netshort 2025). These are "Chinese Vertical Dramas" so called because they are full length feature films, but broken down into short one-minute episodes and filmed with an elongated aspect ratio, designed to be watched on mobile phones!! (Not a medium for expansive gestures!) Other TV has included Adrian featuring as the Ripperologist on "Nichaela Farrell investigates Jack The Ripper" happily searching out, and explaining on camera, in gory detail, all the "Ripper" murders and events at the actual sites in Whitechapel!



Adrian studied at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama 68-70 after leaving Wellingborough, and is proud of continuing to be a member of Equity after 58 years. Adrian also Produces – with two short films "When I'm Famous" (2024) and "Same Face Different Lens" (2025) both doing well on the worldwide film festival circuit. Adrian sends greetings to all who knew him at Wellingborough, but acknowledges he is a member of decreasing band of brothers, but this member of the happy few still soldiers on – as long as he can still remember the lines...

James will switch on the lights on November 27th.

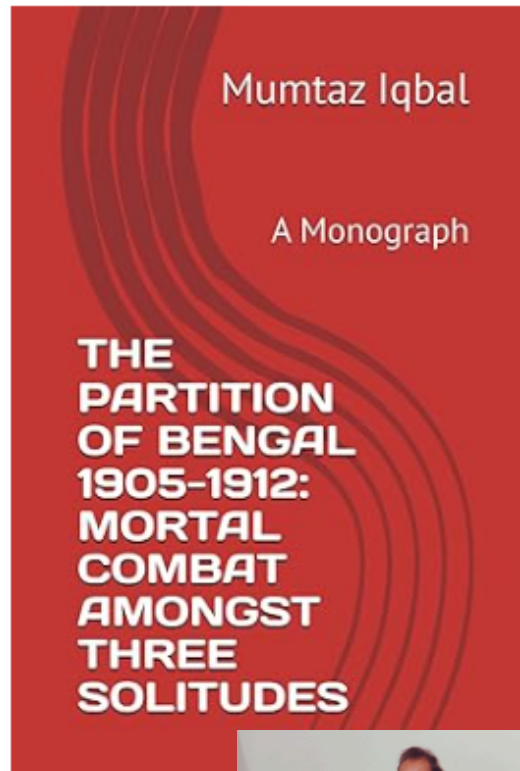

OW Mumtaz Iqbal (54-57, G) write of his recent publication

My monograph on The Partition of Bengal, 1905-1912: Mortal Combat Amongst Three Solitudes is now available on Amazon.

The monograph is the outcome of my history Masters thesis completed at York University, Toronto in 2021 at the ripe age of 81!

The subject The Partition of Bengal 1905-1912: Mortal Combat amongst Three Solitudes is relevant and critical to understanding the history of Bangladesh--from where I come-- and its material impact on South Asian History and cartography in 1947, 1971 and even now. The details and impact of the Partition are not widely known in Bangladesh. I wrote the monograph to try to remedy this situation and to improve my understanding.



The story of the Partition of Bengal in 1905 and its annulment in 1912 is critical to understanding the political and social factors that foreshadowed the partition of India in 1947, division of Pakistan and the establishment of Bangladesh in 1971, the rise to power of the BJP in India, and ongoing seminal developments in contemporary Bangladesh.

Publication review by Mike Askham (staff 1978-2013)

If, like me, you've felt inadequate about your understanding of the plight of both Jews and Palestinian Arabs prior to the outbreak of WW 2, then I recommend reading the Tavistock Working Group 2024's analysis of those standpoints. The book may be obtained by following [here](#).

Co-edited by OW Consultant Psychiatrist, Mona [nee Shahid] Freeman (89-94, W), the essays should, at best, challenge preconceived viewpoints and, at worst, via the excellent appendices, fill in those gaps in your historical knowledge of these two peoples.

Dr Freeman is quite clear in underlining that, for her, the mental health of the children caught up in the conflict dominates her thinking. There is a strong acknowledgement in many of the essays that the group's regular meetings were not easy, but that they tried to hold onto the belief that, 'Intractable conflict requires diplomacy, not war. And for that, everyone needs a seat at the table, and to be able, and enabled, to sit down.' Students and teachers of Politics, History, RE and Psychology should read it.



OW News - Running

OW Lois Wagstaff (07-12, M) took part in her second Northampton Half Marathon this October and despite an injury during training was able to complete it in a respectable time of 1h48.

Lois said of the race, 'I was never the most sporty pupil during my time at Wellingborough School however post Covid I decided I was going to start running to improve my physical and mental health. This was the second time I ran the Northampton Half Marathon. I managed to complete my first half marathon in 2024 with a time of 1hr47 and this year my goal was to achieve a new PB. Unfortunately, my training for 2025 was interrupted by an Achilles injury but thanks to a good physio and a great running community around me I managed a time of 1hr48. A hopefully a new PB is not too far away for me.'



Will Knibbs (03-10, G) took part in the world famous Berlin Marathon in September.

"On 21 September I took part in the BMW Berlin Marathon, which was my 3rd marathon so far.

It is one of the largest in the world, with over 55,000 runners alone, and the route takes in a lot of the famous landmarks of the city, with the final stretch including running through the Brandenburg Gate.

Despite the temperature reaching 27 degrees very early in the day making conditions very tough, I was able to finish in 4:16:14, a personal best by a mere 17 seconds!

I'm now looking forward to the Valencia marathon in December hoping to go under 4 hours."

Steen Taphouse (77-82, W) took part in the Mammuth March in Copenhagen in August. Steen was one of 3,000 participants in the 100KM race which saw only 70% of competitors complete the challenge which had a cut off of 24 hours.

He was satisfied to finish in a time of 19 hours and 55 minutes after starting the race at mid afternoon.

Steen said, 'I expected walking through the night would be a challenge and that was definitely true. We were off the beaten track, so it was pitch black with only the beam of my headlamp, making it difficult to find far off points as motivation, so it just felt like we were walking for ever. A small mental crisis at 75km, rectified by two large cups of coffee, a change of socks and a Nutella sandwich. Spirits rose with the rising sun and all went well until the last 5km. These last 5km just seemed to go on and on for ever.'

Danny's participation back in 2012 had a huge impact on all the other riders who took part, proving just what is possible for people with a spinal cord injury. In 2017, Danny very sadly passed away at the age of 43 after an ongoing battle with cancer.

Lucas was excited to finally be a part of this ride which has played a significant role in his life despite not having the opportunity to participate in it before.

Lucas said of the event, 'The ride went amazingly, we were all very sore by the end of it as you could imagine. But it was really inspiring to ride alongside the hand cyclists, and to raise as much money as we did for BackUp, (around £270,000) really means a lot. I'll definitely be doing it again.'

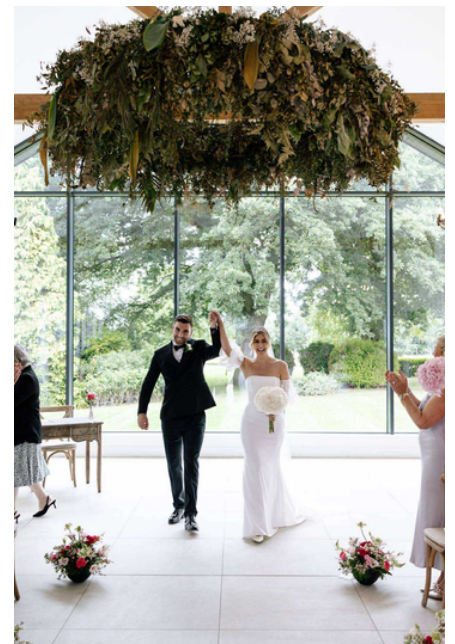

From the archives



In October we were contacted by Julian Sproule, the nephew of Old Wellingburian HBL Hillcoat (dates). Julian has developed his uncle's profile as a Battle of Britain pilot as part of a project at the Institute of Historical Research School of Advanced Studies (University of London). Harry Bryan Lillie Hillcoat was born on 19th October 1913 and attended the School as the recipient of a scholarship. During his time here he represented Wellingborough School at shooting competitions at Bisley. After leaving school he enlisted in a Territorial unit, the 6th Battalion Royal Warwickshire Regiment before being employed by the Ford Motor Company. After later developing an interest in flying, he received his Aero certificate 11830 in 1934, before being called to full-time service in 1939.

Following various postings, Hillcoat joined No.1 Squadron in France on 10th May 1940 at Rouen-Boos. Hillcoat failed to return from a squadron patrol on 3rd September 1940 in Hurricane P3044 and was reported 'Missing'.

OW News - Obituaries

Ian Mellor, (70-78, F)



Ian joined Wellingborough School in 1970, in the Junior School and boarded in Fryers House, in the Senior School, while his family travelled abroad with the Foreign Office. He left in 1979 after completing A Levels.

During his time at school, he excelled in Geography, Art and Music, and developed an early interest in photography. He was also among the first pupils to experience the new computer science room in the mid-1970s, a subject that would later shape his career. Ian's love of art endured long after his schooldays, and he remained in touch with former teacher, Duncan Ellison, for many years.

Ian's education in computing led him to Plessey, the electronics, defence and telecommunications company, where he combined work with a university course in computer programming and coding. After graduating, he joined Lloyds Bank to become a systems analyst project leader, a role that also took him overseas, including to India in the early 2010s.

Outside his professional and family life, photography was Ian's lifelong passion. He became an Associate of the Royal Photographic Society (ARPS) and won several photographic award distinctions. After he took early retirement from Lloyds, in 2019, he became a freelance photographer. His work included portraits, landscapes and more abstract studies, and he earned recognition in numerous competitions.

Music was a major passion for Ian. Shortly after leaving Wellingborough, Ian formed a 3-piece post-punk band called The Void, whose debut single "Into The Void" was played by John Peel on Radio 1 in 1983. Though the band never became a household name, they were well-known in the area for their original songs, many featuring Milton Keynes as the subject, such 'No Bus on Sundays' and 'Urban Cows' until they disbanded at the end of the 1980s. The Void reunited in 2023 to mark their 40th anniversary, with a special performance at The Stables in Milton Keynes.

Ian also developed a deep appreciation for craft beer and was a familiar face at CAMRA festivals and pubs across the country, often in the company of his old bandmates. In a fitting tribute, one of the breweries he frequented even produced a beer named 'Void' in honour of the band.

Above all, Ian was a devoted father, brother and friend. He remained close to his family and kept in touch with many friends from his days at Wellingborough. His two sons, Charles and Tim, both musicians themselves, were inspired by their father's love of music and creativity.

Ian was diagnosed with kidney cancer in June and passed away peacefully on Sunday 20th July after a short but devastating illness. He will be remembered with affection, admiration and gratitude by all who knew him.

Michael Port, (61-72, C)

We are saddened to announce the unexpected death of OW, Michael Port. Michael, who resided in Wellingborough, was instrumental in the running of the OW Golf Society for many years and was a valuable member of the Halford Hewitt and Cyril Gray teams. He was secretary of the OWGS for numerous years until he retired in 2011, but he would still pop in at events to support. His passion for golf also saw him crowned Club Champion of Wellingborough Golf Club in 1976.

Before retirement Michael was an Assistant Bank Manager, but until his death was still treasurer and secretary of 20 Louisa Lilley Almshouses in Wellingborough and Irthlingborough.

Michael passed away suddenly on Sunday 26th October, 2025 and his survived by his sister, Jackie.

His funeral will take place at 11am on the 26th November at Nene Valley Crematorium, with the wake afterwards at the Stag's Head, Gt Doddington.

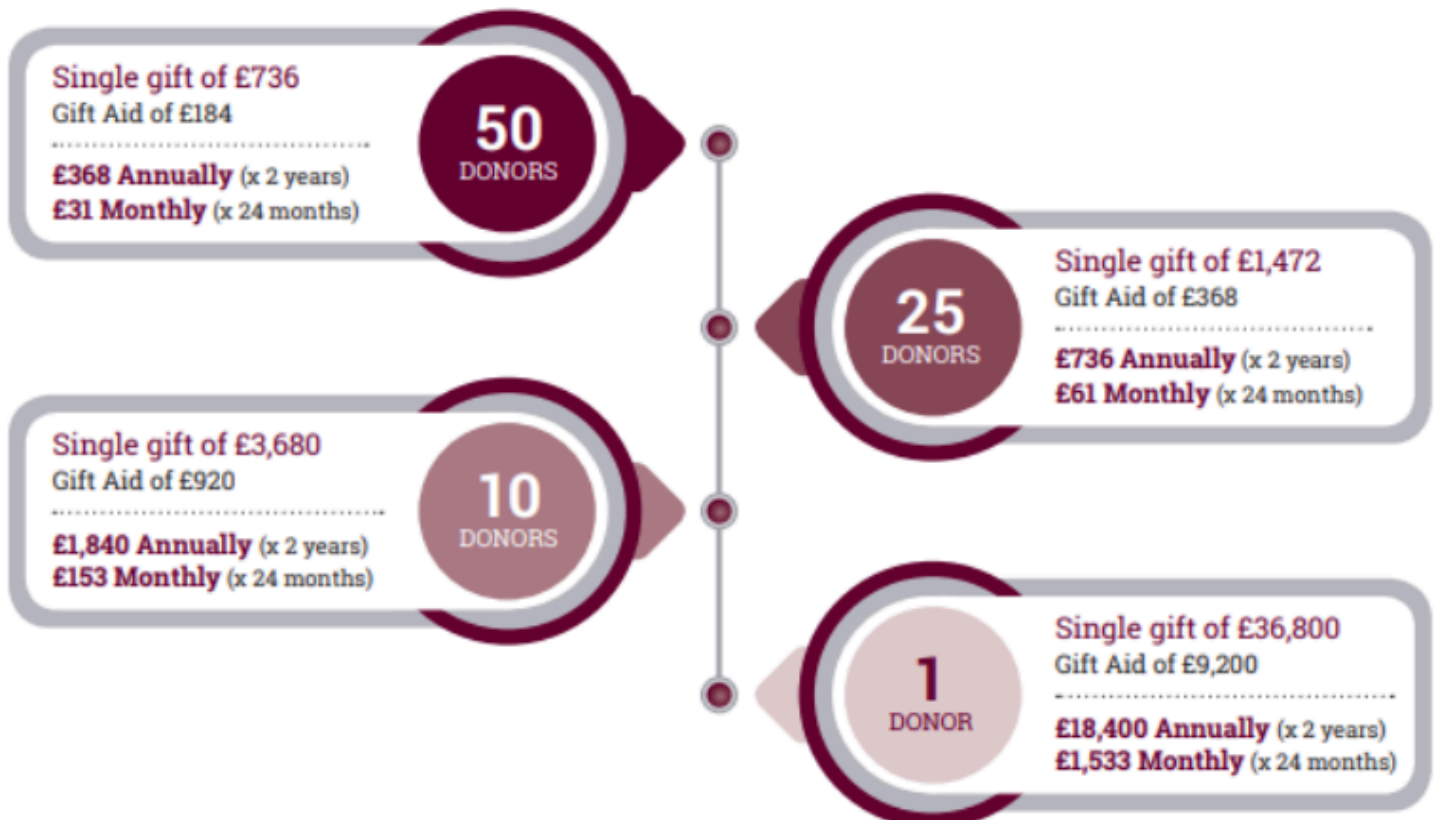
